RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council gives First and Second Reading to the City of Enderby Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 Amendment Bylaw No. 1659, 2018;

AND THAT Council forwards City of Enderby Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 Amendment Bylaw No. 1659, 2018 to a Public Hearing.

BACKGROUND

At its regular meeting of June 18, 2018, Enderby City Council provided policy direction on how it wished to regulate the personal growing of cannabis and the commercial production of non-medical cannabis. Specifically, Council resolved to:

- direct Staff to prepare an amendment to the City of Enderby Zoning Bylaw No. 1550 to prohibit the personal growing of cannabis in the following circumstances:
 - i. In any mobile unit used on a permanent or temporary basis as a residence, or the land contiguous to the unit, or a building or structure on land contiguous to the mobile unit;
 - ii. In any building or structure kept or occupied as a temporary residence, or the land contiguous to the temporary residence, or a building or structure on land contiguous to the temporary residence;
 - iii. In any residential dwelling unit occurring as part of a mixed use development;
 - iv. Outdoors; or
 - v. In multiple occupancy buildings where there are shared walls.
- direct Staff to prepare an amendment to the City of Enderby Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 in order to, i) regulate the production of non-medical cannabis in the same manner as medical cannabis, and ii) update definitions and references to be consistent with the language used in the Provincial and Federal Cannabis enactments.

Staff have prepared an amendment to the Zoning Bylaw in accordance with the previous policy direction, and are advancing it to Council for First and Second Reading.

One item to note is the regulation of the production of non-medical cannabis. Staff had previously recommended that the production of non-medical cannabis be regulated in the same manner as medical cannabis, given that it was unclear at the time how licensed producers under the *Cannabis Act* would be regulated under this enactment. Since then, the Federal government has released the *Cannabis Regulations* which support the *Cannabis Act*.

Although the *Cannabis Regulations* now make it clear how licensed producers under the *Cannabis Act* will be regulated with regards to security clearances, physical security measures, site design, air filtration, etc., it is still unknown how these regulations will be enforced. Should enforcement from upper levels of government be insufficient or ineffective, local government will be left to deal with the consequences and impacts. Given this, Staff are recommending that Council maintains its previous policy direction to regulate the production of non-medical cannabis in the same manner as medical cannabis (i.e. prohibited in all zones except when in the Agricultural Land Reserve, siting regulations when located in the ALR, etc.). Over time, Staff can monitor the level of enforcement for licensed cannabis producers and Council may choose to consider revisiting the level of regulation at the local level, if and when there is an adequate level of confidence in the enforcement regime from upper levels of government.

It should be noted that if Council chooses to maintain its previous policy direction and prohibit the production of cannabis except when located within the ALR, any potential cannabis producer seeking to operate outside of the ALR would have the opportunity to make application for a Zoning Text Amendment. The Zoning Text Amendment application would trigger a public process where those who feel they are affected by the application may make their views known to Council; this process would enable Council to consider proposals for cannabis production on a case-by-case basis, and engage with the community as part of its consideration of applications.

BYLAW NO. 1659, 2018

A BYLAW TO AMEND THE CITY OF ENDERBY ZONING BYLAW NO. 1550, 2014 AND AMENDMENTS THERETO

WHEREAS pursuant to Section 479 of the *Local Government Act*, Council of the City of Enderby may, by bylaw, divide the whole or part of the City of Enderby into zones, name each zone, establish boundaries for the zones and regulate uses within those zones;

AND WHEREAS Council has created zones, named each zone, established boundaries for those zones and regulated uses within those zones by Bylaw No. 1550, cited as "The Corporation of the City of Enderby Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014";

WHEREAS Council of the City of Enderby has determined to make an amendment to "The Corporation of the City of Enderby Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014";

NOW THEREFORE Council of the City of Enderby, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

CITATION

1. This bylaw may be cited as the "City of Enderby Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 Amendment Bylaw No. 1659, 2018".

<u>AMENDMENTS</u>

- Amend Division Two Interpretation of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by removing the definition of 'Marihuana' and including the definition of 'Cannabis' and 'Cannabis Plant' as follows:
 - **CANNABIS** has the same meaning as defined within the *Cannabis Act*, as amended from time to time.
 - CANNABIS PLANT means a plant that belongs to the genus Cannabis.
- Amend Division Two Interpretation of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by removing the definition of 'Marihuana-Related Business' and including the definition of 'Cannabis-Related Business' as follows:
 - **CANNABIS-RELATED BUSINESS** means a business, not-for-profit, charity, cooperative, shared economy venture, or other entity which uses a premises for the consumption, display, storage, sale, trade or other exchange of cannabis or cannabis-containing products, including but not limited to dispensaries and compassion clubs, as permitted by Provincial and Federal enactment.
- 4. Amend Division Two Interpretation of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by removing the definition of 'Medical Marihuana Production Facility' and including the definition of 'Cannabis Production' as follows:

CANNABIS PRODUCTION means to obtain Cannabis by any method or process, including by

- i manufacturing;
- ii. synthesis;
- iii. altering its chemical or physical properties by any means; or
- iv. cultivating, propagating or harvesting it or any living thing from which it may be extracted or otherwise obtained,

provided it is permitted by Provincial and Federal enactment; this specifically excludes Personal Growing of Cannabis.

5. Amend Division Two - Interpretation of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by including the definition of 'Personal Growing of Cannabis' as follows:

PERSONAL GROWING OF CANNABIS PLANTS means the personal cultivation, propagation or harvesting of Cannabis Plants, provided it is permitted by Provincial and Federal enactment.

- 6. Amend Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by replacing all references to 'Medical Marihuana Production Facility' with 'Cannabis Production'.
- 7. Amend Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by replacing all references to 'Marihuana-Related Business' with 'Cannabis-Related Business'.
- 8. Amend Division Three General Regulations of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by including Section 307.3.g as follows:
 - g. Personal Growing of Cannabis in the following circumstances:
 - i. Outdoors;
 - ii. In any mobile unit used on a permanent or temporary basis as a residence, or the land contiguous to the unit, or a building or structure on land contiguous to the mobile unit;
 - iii. In any building or structure kept or occupied as a temporary residence, or the land contiguous to the temporary residence, or a building or structure on land contiguous to the temporary residence:
 - iv. In any residential dwelling occurring as part of a mixed use development;
 or
 - v. In multiple occupancy buildings where there are shared walls.
- 9. Amend Division Three General Regulations of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by including Section 307.7 as follows:

7 Personal Growing of Cannabis

The Personal Growing of Cannabis shall be subject to the requirements contained in the City of Enderby Personal Growing of Cannabis Policy.

10. Amend Division Three - General Regulations of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by replacing the title of Section 312 as follows:

312 Cannabis Production within the Agricultural Land Reserve

- 11. Amend Division Three General Regulations of Schedule "A" of Zoning Bylaw No. 1550, 2014 by replacing Section 312.5 as follows:
 - 5. No Cannabis Production shall be located within 100 meters of any residential zone, daycare facility, preschool, playground, community centre, school, public park, civic or religious institution or any use catering to individuals under the age of 18.

 - 3.22.1 No person shall smoke, vape, consume or ingest Cannabis in any Public Space.

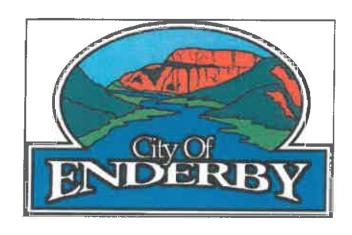

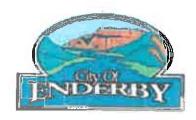

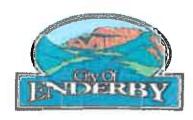

1. Status of the City of Enderby

The City of Enderby ("the City") is a numicipality that was created on March 1, 1905 under the laws of British Columbia. The City provides municipal services such as public works, sewer, water, urban planning, fire protection services, and recreational and cultural services and other general government operations.

2. Significant Accounting policies

These consolidated financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for governments established by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Professional Accountants. The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of all finds of the City. All interfund transfers have been climinated. The significant polices are summarized as follows:

2. Fund accounting

The resources and operations of the City are comparised of the funds listed below. Supporting schedules to the comolidated financial statements are included to show the financial activities and balance of each fund for supplementary information.

General Fund:

Accounts for operating and capital revenues and expenditures for the activities of the City except those included in the water and sewer funds and holds all property required for these purposes and related long term debt.

Water Fund:

Accounts for operating and capital revenues and expenditures for the water utility and holds all property required for these purposes and related long term debt.

Sewer Fond:

Accounts for operating and capital revenues and expenditures for the sewer utility and holds all property required for this purposes and related long term debt.

b. Basis of accounting

The consolidated financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. The accrual basis of accounting records revenue as it is carned and measurable. Expenses are recognized as they are incurred and measurable based upon receipt of goods and services and/or the creation of a legal obligation to pay.

c. School taxes

The City is required by The School Act to bill, collect and remit provincial education support levies in respect of residential and other properties on behalf of the Province, and school division special levies on behalf of school divisions. The City has no jurisdiction or control over the school division's operations or their mill rate increases. Therefore, the taxation, other revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities with respect to the operations of school boards are not reflected in these consolidated financial statements.

d. Temporary investments

Temporary investments consist of term deposits in Canadian Chartered Banks and deposits with the Municipal Finance Authority pooled investment money market fund and are recorded at cost plus carnings reinvested in the finds, which approximates their quoted market value. These investments are redomnable on demand and have an effective average interest rate of 1.63% (2016 - 1.75%).

s. Deferred revenue

Grants, contributions and other amounts are received from third parties pursuant to legislation, regulation or agreement and may only be used in the conduct of certain programs, in the completion of specific work, or for the purchase of tangible capital assets. In addition, certain user charges and fees are collected for which the related services have yet to be performed. Revenue is recognized in the period when the related expenses are incurred, services performed or tangible capital assets acquired.

f. Non-financial assets

Non-financial essets are not available to discharge existing liabilities and are held for use in the provision of services. They have useful lives extending beyond the current year and are not intended for sale in the ordinary course of operations. The change in non-financial assets during the year, together with the excess of revenues over expenses provides the Change in Net Financial Assets for the year.

i. Tangible capital assets

Capital assets consist of land, buildings, engineering structures, water and sewer infrastructure, roads, and machinery and equipment. Tangible capital sasets are recorded at cost which includes all amounts that are directly attributable to the cost, construction, development or betterment of the asset. The cost less residual value, of the tangible capital assets are amortized on a straight line basis over their estimated useful life as follows:

Assets under construction are not amortized until the easet is available for productive use.

ii. Contributions of tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets received as contributions are recorded at their fair value at the date of receipt and elso are recorded as revenue.

ifi. Leases

Leases are classified as capital or operating leases. Leases which transfer substantially all of the benefits and risks incidental to ownership of property are accounted for as capital leases. All other leases are accounted for as operating leases and the related lease payments are charged to expenses as incurred.

g. Revenue recognition

Government grants and transfers are recognized in the financial statements as revenue in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be made. Transfers received for expenditures not yet incurred are included in deformed revenue.

Texation revenues are recognized at the time of issuing property tax notices for the fiscal year. Sale of services and user fees are recognized when the service or product is provided by the City. All other revenue is recognized as it is earned and is measurable. Expenses are recognized as they are incurred and measurable based upon receipt of goods and services and/or the creation of a legal obligation to pay.

h. Debt charges

Debt charges, including principal, interest and foreign exchange are charged to current operations. Interest charges are account for the period from the date of the latest interest payment to the end of the year.

1. Capitalization of Interest

The City capitalizes interest on temporary borrowing until the completion of the project which is to be financed by debenture debt.

1. Reserves

Reserves for future expenditures represent amounts set aside for future operating and capital expenditures.

k. Hudget Figures

The budget figures are from the Financial Plan Bylaw No. 1628, 2017 adopted May 1, 2017. They have been reallocated to conform to PSAB financial statement presentation. Subsequent amendments have been made by Council to reflect changes in the budget as required by law.

1. Use of estimates

The consolidated financial statements of the City have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Public Sector Accounting Board. As such, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. These estimates and assumptions are based on the City's best information and judgment and may differ significantly from actual results. The financial statements have, in the opinion of management been prepared using careful judgment within the reasonable limits of materiality and within the framework of the accounting policies identified.

4. Reserve - Municipal Finance Authority

The City issues its debt instruments through the Municipal Finance Authority. As a condition of these borrowings, a portion of the debenture proceeds are withheld by the Municipal Finance Authority as a debt reserve fund. The City also executes demand notes in connection with each debenture whereby the City may be required to loan certain amounts to the Municipal Pinance Authority. These demand notes are contingent in nature and are not reflected in the accounts. The details of the cash deposits and demand notes at the year end are as follows:

9. Commitments and subsequent events

- (a) During the year, the City entered into a contract with Mountain Side Harthworks to approximately 30% of the project has been completed.
- (b) The amount of vacation and banked time pay has been sourced and is included in accounts payable for the current year. The estimated total liability for wages and benefits at December 31, 2017 is approximately \$130,451 (2016 -\$99,715). Of this amount \$112,105 (2016 - \$79,576) has been accrued and included in accounts payable and account liabilities.

10. Contingent liabilities

- (a) Regional District of North Okanagan: The City is a member of the Regional District of North Okanagan and is liable for its portion of any operating deficits or long-term debt related to functions in which it participates.
- (b) Municipal Insurance Association of BC: Communicing December 31, 1987, the City of Enderby extered into a self insurance scheme with British Columbia municipalities and regional districts. The City is obliged under the scheme to pay a percentage of its fellow insured's losses. The City pays an annual premium, which is satisficated to be adequate to cover any losses insurred.
- (c) Presson Liabilities: The Municipality and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (the "Pisa"), a jointly trusteed pension plan. The board of trustees, representing Plan members and employers, is responsible for administrating the plan, including investment of assets and administration of benefits. The Plan is a multi-employer defined benefit pension plan. Batic pension benefits are based on a famula. As at December 31, 2016, the Plan has about 193,000 active members and approximately 90,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 38,000 contributors from local governments.

Every three years, an actuarial valuation is performed to usess the financial position of the plan and adequacy of plan finding. The actuary determines an appropriate combined employer and member contribution rate to fund the plan. The actuary's calculated contribution rate is based on the entry-age normal cost method, which produces the long-term rate of member and employer contributions sufficient to provide benefits for average inture entrants to the plan. This rate may be adjusted for amortization of any accurrial funding amplus and will be adjusted for the amortization of any unfunded accurrial Hability.

The most recent actuarial valuation for the Municipal Pension Plan as of December 31, 2015, indicated a \$2,224 million funding surplus for basic pension benefits on a going concern basis. As a result of the 2015 basic account actuarial valuation surplus and pursuant to the joint trustee agreement, \$1,927 million was transfered to the rate stabilization account and \$297 million of the surplus ensured the required contribution rates remained unchanged.

The Corporation for the City of Enderby paid \$75,949 (2016 - \$77,650) for employer contributions to the plan in fiscal 2017.

The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2018 with results available in 2019.

Employers participating in the Plan record their pension expense as the amount of employer contributions made during the fiscal year (defined contribution pension plan accounting). This is because the plan records accrued liabilities and accrued assets for the plan in aggregate, resulting in no consistent and reliable basis for allocating the obligation, assets and cost to individual employers participating in the plan.

It is management's opinion that the City is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks erising from these financial instruments.

17. Segmented information

The City of Enderby is a municipal government that provides a range of services to its citizens. For management reporting purposes the City's operations and activities are organized and reported by Fund. Funds were created for the purpose of recording specific activities to attain certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions or limitations.

City services are provided by departments and their activities are reported in these funds. Certain departments have been separately disclosed in the segmented information, along with the services they provide, as follows:

General government services - Legislative, administration and finance

The function of the legislative department includes mayor and souncil is to set bylaws and policies for the governance of the City in accordance with the Community Charter. The function of the Administration Department is to coordinate the operation of the municipality in accordance with policies set by Council. The Administration Department is responsible for functions such as personnel, organizational changes, surployee review and training, manpower planning, strategic planning, information systems, GIS and records management. The mandate of the Phance Department is to solvie excellence in customer service through the efficient and effective use of technology and personal service. Also, to provide operational efficiency, financial planning and accountability through the application of sound accounting practices and internal control. The Pinance Department is responsible for functions such as financial records reporting and safetscoping; investment of manicipal funds; advice and guidance to Council and Administration on financial matters; financial planning and budget development and analysis; property tax and utility user fee notification and collection; accounts payable and receivable; payroil, pendon and benefits administration; records maintenance of tickets, fines and other municipal business.

Protective services - Pire and animal control services

The mandate of the Fire Department is to provide fire suppression service; fire prevention programs; training and education related to prevention, detection or extinguishment of fires. The mandate of Animal Control is to control the animal population and the issuence of dog licenses.

Public works services

The public works department is responsible for the delivery of municipal public works services related to the plenning, development and maintenance of roadway systems, and street lighting.

Bayironnestal health parvices

The mandate of environmental health services is to provide for the collection, disposal and recycling services; and waste minimization programs of solid waste.

Community days broment services

Community development provides services to manage urban development for business interests, environmental concerns, heritage matters, local neighbourhoods and downtown, through City planning, community development, parks and riverbank planning. It ensures an acceptable quality of building construction and maintenance of properties through enforcement of construction codes, building standards and bylaws for the protection of occupants. It facilitates economic development by providing services for the approval of all land development plans, the application and enforcement of zoning bylaws, and the processing of building permit applications.

Recreational and enitural services

The recreational and cultural services mandate in cooperation with the Regional District is to provide for the maintenance of parks and open space.

Area P Services

The City administers Fortune Parks, Animal Control & Cometery services for the citizens of Area F.

Water supply and services

The water department provides for the delivery of sufe drinking water to the citizans of Enderby.

Sower services

The sewer department provides for the collection and treatment of wastewater.

Certain allocation methodologies are employed in the proparation of segmented financial information. The General Revenue Fund reports on municipal services that are funded primarily by traction such as property and business tax revenues. Traction and psymmetric-in-lieu of taxes are apportioned to General Revenue Fund services based on the Fund's net surplus. Certain government grants, transfers from and to other funds, and other revenues have been apportioned based on a percentage of budgeted expenses.

The accounting policies used in these segments are consistent with those followed in preparation of the consolidated financial statements as disclosed in Note 2. For additional information see the Consolidated Schedule of Segment Disclosure - Service (Schedule 1).

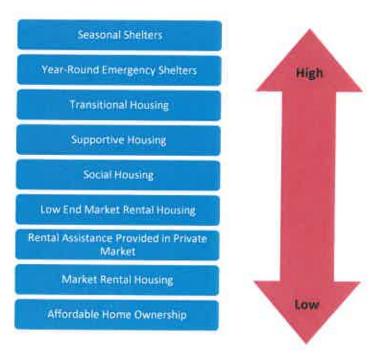
RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council provides a letter of support for the Regional District of North Okanagan's application to the BC Rural Dividend for the development of a regional housing strategy.

BACKGROUND

Given the challenges associated with a lack of housing, the Regional District of North Okanagan is proposing to undertake a regional housing strategy. Correspondence is attached from RDNO's Regional Projects Planning Manager describing the proposed initiative.

Housing strategies assess the needs of an area relative to a continuum of dwelling options that vary with barriers and income. This ranges from "non-market" housing options that require higher levels of government financial assistance through to "market" housing requiring minimal to no government financial assistance.

A regional housing strategy is critical given that the success of a particular type of housing is tied to factors such as proximity to particular services. As a result, a regional scope can help to ensure that there is a rational approach to fulfilling the needs and aspirations of people across the entire spectrum.

In addition, this strategy will support future initiatives by the City of Enderby in support of enhanced housing opportunities in accordance with its Official Community Plan. Specifically, the following objectives were identified in section 4.3 of the OCP:

Council has the following objectives for Housing:

- a. All residents of Enderby have access to quality affordable, attainable, and special needs housing.
- b. There is a spectrum of housing choices throughout the community which meet the diverse housing needs of residents.

Due to the reduced number of meetings scheduled during the summer, this matter is being advanced to obtain support in principle, subject to formal approval by the RDNO Board of Directors later in the week.

Hi Tate,

In follow up to our conversation please find attached the preliminary Scope of Work and Deliverables for a Regional Affordable Housing Strategy. As you are aware affordable housing is one of the greatest challenges we have in the North Okanagan so we are looking to develop a strategy that will identify both policy and on-the-ground recommendations / actions to address this issue. The participant communities include: City of Enderby, City of Armstrong, Township of Spallumcheen, District of Coldstream, Village of Lumby and five Electoral Areas. Staff have been in touch with the City of Vernon and the Social Planning Council, which is currently coordinating the evaluation and update of the city's Homelessness and Housing Strategy. It is proposed that the work that is to be undertaken in this process would parallel what the City of Vernon is doing in an effort to identify policies and actions that have a regional context and scope. The city of Vernon is not officially listed as a partner due to the grant application criteria that it be utilized for communities with a population of 25,000 or less. RDNO Planning Staff have reached out to both Splatsin and OKIB to determine if they would like to partner on this initiative.

The Regional Growth Management Advisory Committee passed the following resolution on June 21, 2018:

That staff be directed to apply for Federation of Canadian Municipalities Climate Change grants to facilitate policy discussions on Climate Change Adaptation **as well as any available grant opportunities to pursue the development of a Regional Housing Strategy**.

The BC Rural Dividend Program has been identified as a good funding opportunity however, the application deadline is July 31st (so unfortunately a quick turnaround time). A report and copy of the Scope of Work and Deliverables for a Regional Affordable Housing Strategy will be going forward to the Board of Directors on Wed July 18th, 2018 with the following recommendation:

That the Regional District North Okanagan authorize the submission of an application to the BC Rural Dividend program for \$115,000 for the development of a Regional Housing Strategy; and further,

That the Board of Directors support the Regional Housing Strategy project through its duration.

In order to strengthen the application we are looking for a letter of support from each participant community. I will send an e-mail to all CAO's after the July 18th BoD meeting providing confirmation that the BoD has supported this grant application.

RDNO REGIONAL HOUSING STRATEGY-SCPOPE OF WORK

In support of the Regional Growth Strategy vision and to better understand regional housing issues and opportunities, RDNO is seeking support to prepare a *Regional Affordable Housing Strategy* (RAHS). The purpose of the RAHS is to identify housing needs and gaps (by community), recommend local government strategies to address housing issues, and identify preliminary opportunities to develop housing projects.

In addition, it is expected that key deliverables from this process will serve as key information sources to support local governments as well as non-profit housing societies with realizing potential housing project development opportunities such as funding applications to provincial and federal housing programs.

Communities within the geographic scope include Armstrong, Coldstream, Enderby, Lumby, Spallumcheen, and the five Electoral Areas. The City of Vernon is excluded as a partner due to the grant funding criteria and the fact that they are currently up-dating their Homelessness and Housing Strategy. The outcomes of their work will be analyzed and included in the final Regional Affordable Housing Strategy.

Scope of Work and Deliverables

1. Background Report (Housing Indicators) - 3 months

The purpose of Task 1 is to assemble and analyze key housing indicators that demonstrate current and anticipated housing needs and gaps using relevant statistical sources:

- Provide a regional housing contextual overview in relation to neighbouring or comparable regions and compare to the rest of the Province.
- Analyze housing indicators from a variety of sources (e.g. RDNO State of the Region report, State
 of the Basin report, Statistics Canada, CMHC, wait list data, etc.) to provide an overview of the
 region's housing situation. Where available, data is required at the regional level as well as each
 municipality and unincorporated area.
- Key Deliverable: Background Housing Report.

2. Community and Stakeholder Engagement - 3 months

The purpose of Task 2 is to engage with community stakeholders and the broader public to understand their observations, experiences and concerns related to housing:

- Prepare an Engagement and Communications Plan that outlines events and activities to engage community stakeholders and the broader public.
- Coordinate and facilitate engagement events and activities (e.g. focus groups, workshops etc.).
- Key Deliverable: Engagement Summary Report.

3. Regional Housing Needs Assessment – 1 month

Informed by the background Housing Indicators Report and community and stakeholder engagement, the purpose of Task 3 is to prepare a clear and concise Housing Needs Assessment Report:

- Outline housing needs and gaps in the region. Where possible, identify needs and gaps at the regional level as well as each municipality and unincorporated area.
- Identify priority population groups in need of housing (e.g. seniors, families, at-risk groups, etc).
- To the extent possible, provide a high-level estimate of the number of affordable housing units needed in each community to address housing needs and gaps.
- Key Deliverable: Regional Housing Needs Assessment Report.

4. Regional Affordable Housing Strategy - 3 months

The purpose of Task 4 is to create a strategy to address the housing needs and gaps in the region (outlined in the Housing Needs Assessment Report):

- Review relevant policies and initiatives (i.e. RGS, Official Community Plans, etc.) and highlight their
 implications to the RAHS. Identify policy gaps and or policies/initiatives that fall short of addressing
 current and anticipated housing needs.
- Develop practical housing policy and strategic action recommendations to address policy gaps.
 Where possible, identify policy and strategic actions at the regional level as well as specific to each municipality and unincorporated area. Ensure policy and strategic action recommendations are related to demonstrated need.
- Prioritize policy and strategic action recommendations.
- Prepare an implementation framework to guide decisions, with an actionable timeline that considers local government capacity and the varying complexity of each recommendation.
- Key Deliverable: Regional Affordable Housing Strategy.

5. Housing Project Analysis – 2 months

The purpose of Task 5 is to take immediate action on implementation by identifying preliminary opportunities to develop housing projects:

- Prepare up to six (6) high-level concept plans for potential housing development projects in the region.
- High-level concept plans should include: target population (related to demonstrated need), unit types, rent ranges, capital and operating budget, and 10-year cash flow. Demonstrate how the high-level concept plans align with provincial housing programs.
- Preliminary site drawings and/or architectural drawings are not expected at this stage.
- Key Deliverable: Up to six (6) high-level Housing Project Analysis Briefs.

Summary of Key Deliverables:

- 1. Background Report (Housing Indicators).
- 2. Engagement Summary Report.
- 3. Regional Housing Needs Assessment Report.
- 4. Regional Affordable Housing Strategy.
- 5. Housing Project Analysis Briefs (up to 6).

Timeline

It is anticipated that the full scope of work will take approximately 12 months to complete upon commencement, subject to internal review of deliverables.

Subject: UBCM 2018 Provincial Meeting Requests and Attendance

RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council identifies the Provincial ministries, agencies, commissions, or corporations for which it wishes to request a meeting at the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) conference in 2018;

AND THAT Council indicates any meeting topics for which it wishes staff to prepare an information brief prior to UBCM;

AND FURTHER THAT Council confirms which members are planning to attend the UBCM conference in 2018.

BACKGROUND

The Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) conference will be hosted in Whistler, BC from September 10-14. The theme is *Communication, Collaboration, Cooperation*. At UBCM, local government elected officials have an opportunity to request meetings with Provincial ministries, agencies, commissions, and corporations.

The deadline for submitting meeting requests for most Provincial officials is July 27, 2018. If Council wishes to request a meeting on a particular topic but is unsure of the responsible Provincial unit, Staff will contact UBCM to confirm the most appropriate person. Staff will research and prepare information briefs for any topic upon request.

Staff are recommending to Council that it requests a meeting with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to gain an update on progress regarding ride-sharing. Council's prior policy on ride-sharing was endorsed by UBCM in 2017 (the policy and the Provincial response are attached to this memorandum). Since that time, Council has had the opportunity to present to a Provincial select committee on ride-sharing on the need to craft legislation that will help establish this service in rural and remote communities. As the enabling legislation for ride-sharing is still forthcoming, it would be worthwhile to gain an update from the Minister about how Council's policy position may be incorporated.

As well, at the June 18, 2018 meeting, Councillor Shishido had suggested that a UBCM meeting with the Ministry of Children and Families may be necessary in light of proposed changes to the delivery of the "Early Years" program that may affect local decision-making.

B57 REGULATION OF RIDE-SHARING SERVICES IN SMALL, RURAL, & REMOTE COMMUNITIES

WHEREAS the Province of BC has expressed its intent to create a regulatory framework that permits ridesharing services and transportation network companies to operate in BC;

AND WHEREAS the assessment of the possible impacts of allowing new entrants into the passenger transportation field has focused primarily on large urban communities with robust, established, passenger transportation options, which is often not the reality for small, rural, and remote communities where ridesharing and transportation networking offers uniquely viable solutions in the absence of other options:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that UBCM ask the Province of BC to implement a viable, flexible, ridesharing service regulation in BC with attention given to regulatory solutions that will help solve those passenger transportation challenges that are unique to small, rural, and remote communities.

RESPONSE: Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure

As current laws do not accommodate changes in technology and consumer demand, consultations and research are being undertaken by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to determine how to modernize the *Passenger Transportation Act* to allow for expanded service options while creating a level playing field for all passenger transportation service providers in communities across B.C.

The Ministry's main concern is to ensure the system we put in place will continue to prioritize the provision of safe, fair and accessible passenger transportation.

In October 2017, we engaged Dr. Dan Hara of Hara Associates to lead a stakeholder consultation to identify opportunities to modernize passenger transportation legislation to allow taxis to compete on a level playing field with new entrants entering the marketplace.

In January 2018, an all-party Standing Committee of MLAs heard from stakeholders and experts on issues including public safety, vehicle insurance, the impact of introducing ride hailing on communities and the concurrent provincial and municipal regulation of the industry.

The Ministry understands that people want more options for getting around quickly, safely and affordably. Government is expected to release a report in the spring of 2018 that will include considerations from both the consultation and the Standing Committee reports, with legislative changes anticipated for fall 2018.

Hotel Development at 600 Railway Street

RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council directs Staff to prepare an amendment to Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1549, 2014 to include a policy statement supporting 600 Railway Street as a potential location for a hotel development;

AND THAT Council directs Staff to send a letter to the owner of 600 Railway Street describing existing Zoning, Official Community Plan, and Integrated Community Sustainability Plan policies pertinent to a potential hotel development.

BACKGROUND

It has come to the City's attention that the owner of 600 Railway Street (3 separate parcels) is interested in selling part of the property for redevelopment to a hotel use.

The 2.43 acre property is zoned and designated as Highway and Tourist Commercial (C.2), which includes hotels as a permitted use. The property is located adjacent to the Shuswap River and Jim Watt Heritage Riverwalk, and is in close proximity to downtown businesses and the Splatsin Community Centre.

It is recommended that Council direct Staff to prepare an amendment to Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1549, 2014 to include a policy statement supporting 600 Railway Street as a potential location for a hotel development; this is generally consistent with the following broad objectives currently in the Official Community Plan (OCP):

- <u>Economic Development</u> 5.2.d.vi Enderby has an appropriate supply of accommodation
 which throughout the year meets the needs of the tourist population within the community;
 and
- <u>Parks and Recreation</u> 17.2.h There is sufficient accommodation within the community to meet the needs of visitors who come to Enderby to enjoy the recreational opportunities that the community has to offer.

As with any amendment to the OCP, it would need to go through consultation to external agencies and a public hearing prior to adoption. It should be noted that the OCP as it exists today and the current

Zoning Bylaw already allow for a hotel use at this location, so the proposed amendment is mainly intended to express the policy with a greater degree of specificity.

In addition to amending the OCP to provide broad support at the policy level, it is recommended that Council direct Staff to send a letter to the property owner describing existing Zoning, OCP, and Integrated Community Sustainability Plan policies pertinent to a potential hotel development.
